



## ‘The Infiltration’ of Tushar Chattopadhyay: The Sole Novel of Rudderless Naxalite Movement

### Abstract

Thushar Chattopadhyay is a well-known author in North Bengal of West Bengal. He wrote far from hundred of short stories and ten Novels. His first Novel is ‘The Infiltration’ (‘Anuprabes’) was published by the financial assistance of Government of West Bengal in 1983. The back ground of this Novel is the Naxalite Movement in tea-garden area of Dooars in Bengal. The Novel highlights the insubstantiality of Naxalite political theory. They worked in field to abolish the representative of state i. g. the polish-military-bureaucrat. Humanism was neglected by their party rules. Bharati alias Shubhra was planned to murder of a tea-garden manager named Abanish Maulik, who was an uncle of Bharati. Orphan Bharati took shelter after lost her parents as daughter in Abanish Maulik’s house. In the other hand, the husband of Shubhra , Upal also took shelter in this house for save his life from students politics. He was a class representative from Student Federation in College. He took membership of C. P.I.(M.L) for love of Bharati, not for party. Actually, Upal was C.P.I.(M) minded person. So, Upal announced in front of death by Bharati and others, the confusion of Naxalite theory in the last page of this Novel.
